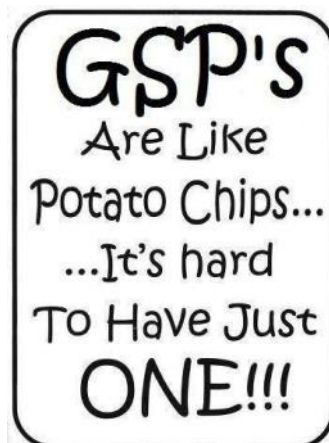
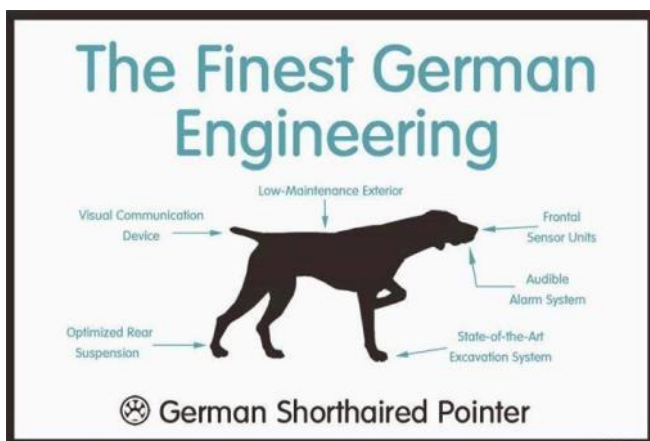

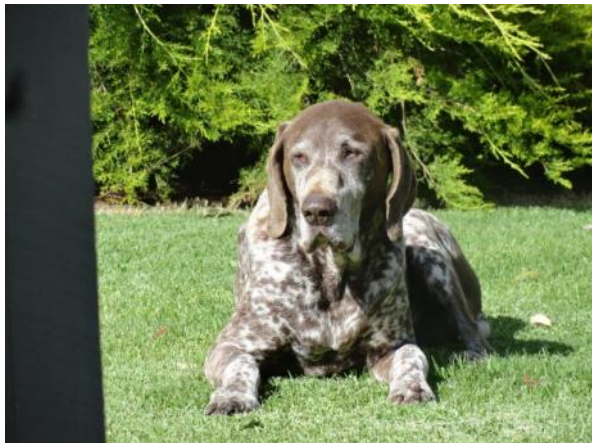

'JACK'

Ch Topnotch Exalt RRD

We love all of our dogs and they are all special, but let's face it, just like family some are more special than others. Jack was one of the extra special ones. Jack took up so much of my life for so long, he has left a big hole, as they do, but I am forever thankful that I had the good fortune to spend 14 years sharing his company.

I showed Jack to his show champion title as a young dog, he was no world beater but a sound, moderate dog with few faults and a happy attitude in the ring. However it was in the facet of retrieving that Jack was truly at home and I have many wonderful memories of trialling him throughout his career.

Jack loved to bark, he would bark heeling up to the pegs, bark when he got to the pegs, and bark whenever he had to stop on the whistle. Everyone at the trial site knew when Jack was running, each time I blew the stop whistle he would turn around to face me and go 'woo, woo, woo'. I am sure he was saying 'what do you want! I am busy out here'. I lost track of the number of times judges told me that Jack would have won if he just hadn't barked, but he did, always.



Jack competed at restricted level for 3 ½ years before gaining his RRD title. During that time he gained 3 first places (at last), 10 second places and 12 3rd places, this consistency led to him winning the GSP club annual awards retrieving trial sash on a number occasions. As Jack got older he became very trial wise and apart from his barking he used to lose a lot of points by getting to the firing point quite a while before I did and waiting for me there, and by ending up a metre in front of me at the pegs before he was told to fetch.



Always a gentleman with other dogs Jack was frightened of young puppies and I have many memories of him walking through a litter of young pups playing on the lawn trying to make himself as tall as possible trying to keep out of reach. If you picked a puppy up for him to sniff he simply left the premises. Around 10 weeks of age he would decide that they were OK but prior to that they were just really scary.

Thanks for the good times Jack and I know that you are woo, woo, wooing with all of your friends.

IN RECOGNITION OF ACHIEVEMENT

"..... I wrote this article to acknowledge the recent achievements of Prue Winkfield and her dogs in retrieving trial competitions, and as a thankyou to her for all the assistance and support she has given me with my two GSP's, Rain and Zeuska (both Yorifeld bred)"

Working gundogs winning, placing and even finishing in Retrieving (and Field) State and National Championships indicate success at the highest level. Usually, 45 to 50 dogs compete in State and National Retrieving Trials, and most of those are Labradors, with an average of 5 to 10 dogs actually managing to complete all the runs over the two or three day event. So, for a 'minority' breed such as German Shorthaired Pointers (GSP's) to be amongst those top 5 to 10 dogs to finish is an achievement to be proud of.

For the past three years GSP's have been prominent in Retrieving Championships and one lady in particular has been consistently leading the charge. Prue Winkfield (Yorifeld Kennels) breeds, trains and competes with her dogs across Australia, and in 2011 she ran RtCh Yorifeld Tornado NFD (Torn) in the National Retrieving Trial held in Jugiong, NSW, where he finished and she was awarded Top Lady Handler. In 2012 RtCh Yorifeld Joy to the World (Joy) was runner up at the Nationals in W.A. and Torn won the W.A. State Championship. Unfortunately Prue was unable to make the trip across the Nullarbor due to last minute illness, and Gareth Tawton ran both dogs for her, with no time for him or the dogs to get to know each other – quite an achievement!

2013 has proven to be Torn's best year yet. Following on from his success in W.A., Prue handled him to another win at the Queensland State Championship (I believe she is the first lady handler to do so with a GSP) and then, just to prove that although 'two out of three ain't bad, three out of three is even better, Torn won the Victorian State Championship in Sale in September. As an indication of his versatility, he also obtained his Novice Field Title this year.

The Victorian State Championship win was very special for Prue. As far as I am aware, Torn is the first GSP to win this event, and Prue is the first winning Lady Handler. The fact that Joy came 4th in this event added to the record breaking career of Prue and her GSP's!

I was fortunate enough to be present to witness the culmination of Prue's success so far at the Championship in Sale this year, where she came away with so many awards that she had to have the assistance of two other competitors to bring everything back home for her! She was overwhelmed with trophies for running the winning dog, (Torn), the Highest Scoring Veteran dog (Joy), Highest Scoring Non Labrador (Torn), Highest Scoring Lady Handler and, as luck would have it, having drawn both Torn and Joy in the team event, Top Team winners for the weekend as well.

Of course, Torn's success is not really all that surprising, considering his mother was my black and white bitch, Yorifeld Rain Lover, who herself has demonstrated Prue's breeding acumen by obtaining her AARD despite the handicap of being trained and run by an inexperienced handler - myself!



IN RECOGNITION OF ACHIEVEMENT *continued...*

No-one can dismiss Prue's success as just being lucky with one or two particularly talented dogs. She has consistently challenged and frequently broken records in this traditionally male dominated environment for many years, having been involved in the sports of Retrieving and Field Trialling with her GSP's since the 1980's. She shows no signs of having peaked in her success either – despite her age (70+) and a back injury slowing her down, at the time of writing, her young dog, Yorifeld Cup Hero (Rider) has placed in each of his five Novice attempts so far with two wins and two seconds before his second birthday!

Prue is a single woman who does not have the benefit of an obliging partner to 'toss the dummies' for her or help her out in the daily training routine. Added to this her choice of breed being GSP's - a breed that does not enjoy the same reputation of reliability and steadiness as Labradors and Golden Retrievers, makes the consistent success she has had with her dogs a noteworthy achievement.



Prue is a quiet achiever, who modestly goes about her business without forcing her opinions on others, but is always willing to offer guidance and assistance when asked. She has given me a great deal of help over the years, and spends long hours researching and exploring how best to deal with the many and varied challenges that GSP's love to come up with to test their owners knowledge, skills and patience.

I believe she deserves recognition of her consistent success, and should be justifiably proud of what she, and her beloved GSP's, have achieved in the sport of Gundog Retrieving competition.

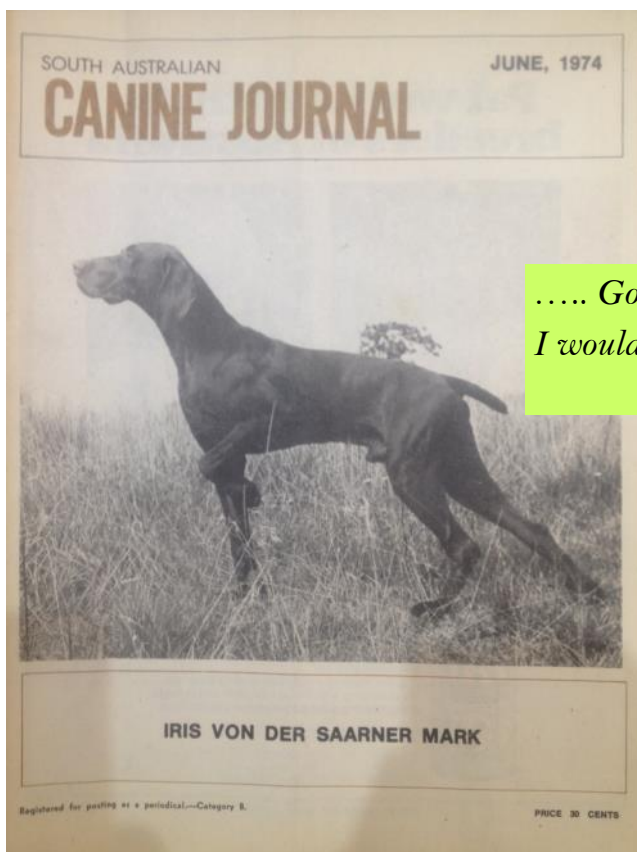

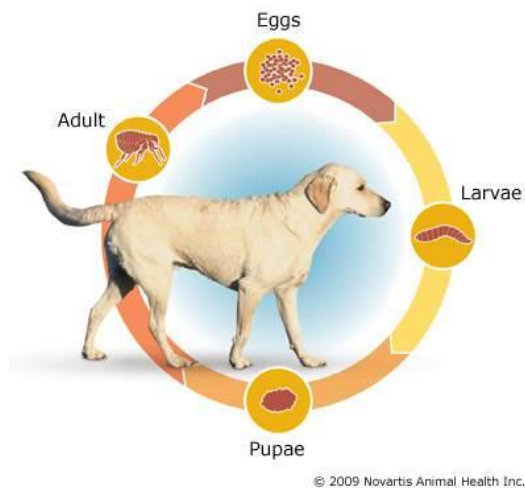

Health Bulletin - Fleas



The most prevalent species of flea to infest pets around the globe is the cat flea. In order to understand how flea infestations occur, it is important to have a basic understanding of the flea life cycle. The dog flea life cycle has four main stages. The adult fleas you see on your pet are only 5% of any flea infestation, the remaining 95% are living as immature stages in your home.

Eggs

Once on a host, adult cat fleas take a blood meal and mate. Within 36 to 48 hours, the female begins laying eggs. Flea eggs are pearly white, oval with rounded ends and approximately 0.5 mm long. Eggs typically make up 50% of an infestation in the home. The female flea lays her eggs in the haircoat of the host. Since the eggs are not sticky, they fall off the host into the environment. Thus, flea eggs may be deposited in all those places to which the dog or cat has access. Female fleas can lay from 20 to 50 eggs a day and up to 2000 eggs during their lifetime. Eggs usually hatch in 1 to 10 days, depending on temperature and humidity. Humidities below 50% and over 92% kill flea eggs.

Larvae

Newly hatched flea larvae are slender, white, segmented and worm-like. They are sparsely covered with short hairs and are 1 to 2 mm in length. They have an egg-tooth, similar to that of a bird, that they use to cut their way out of the egg. Larvae are free moving, and survive by feeding on organic debris found in their environment and on adult flea faeces, which is essential for successful development. Once the larvae have ingested adult flea faeces or other material they become darker in colour. They have been observed to crawl as far as 6 meter (20 feet) while in this stage of their life cycle.

Since larvae are negatively phototactic (avoid light) and positively geotropic (prefer to move downward), they are found deep in carpet fibres, mattress or couch stuffing materials or organic debris (branches, leaves, etc.). They accumulate in areas where the animal spends a great amount of time. These "hotspots" are typically in pet resting areas. They are not usually found in open lawn. Flea larvae are extremely susceptible to heat and desiccation. Moisture in the larval environment is essential for development; relative humidity below 50% cause dessication. Flea larvae undergo two molts before developing into the Pupal stage. While the first larval instar is no more than 2 mm long, the fully developed larvae can be 4 to 5 mm in length. The larval stage usually lasts 5 to 11 days, depending upon the availability of food and the climatic conditions, and will account for about 35% of an infestation in a home. The transition from egg to larva, between molts and from larva to pupa, is controlled by juvenile hormone. When the juvenile hormone level drops, the larva molts to the next stage. The actual molting process is triggered by another hormone, ecdysone.

Pupae

Upon completion of development, the mature larva produces a silk-like cocoon in which it pupates. The cocoon is ovoid, whitish, and loosely spun. Because the cocoon is sticky, it quickly becomes coated with debris from the environment which helps camouflage it. In most homes, the pupation can be completed within 5 to 14 days in ideal conditions. Once the pupa has fully developed, the adult flea (pre-emerged adult) will remain inside the cocoon for several days to several weeks until stimulated to emerge from the cocoon. Physical pressure (being stepped on), carbon dioxide (that mammals exhale), vibration (from walking, or vacuuming) and heat (generated by potential hosts or heated homes) can all stimulate emergence. It is interesting to note that flea pupae do not hatch all at once regardless of the stimuli. It is believed there is some type of communication involved (Pheromonal?, Genetic?) that causes flea pupae to stagger their hatching over a varied period of time. This effect is sometimes mistakenly perceived as a flea control product failure when it is in fact a normal mechanism of the flea to increase the likelihood of survival. The fully formed adult flea residing in the cocoon (pre-emerged adult) is the stage that can extend the longevity of the flea, and makes it the most troublesome from a control standpoint. If the pre-emerged adult does not receive the proper stimulus to emerge, it can remain dormant in the cocoon for several weeks and possibly as long as one year in rare conditions, until a suitable host arrives. Added to this is the fact that there are no chemical sprays available on the market today that can penetrate the pupal cocoon. House sprays will kill exposed eggs and larvae, but pupae will remain unaffected and will hatch at some point long after the residual effect of most sprays has expired. Successful treatment of pupae must usually wait until it has hatched into an adult where it may then be killed with an adulticide. Cocoon's are typically spun around the base of carpet fibers or bedding material which make them impossible to remove with regular vacuuming. Vacuuming is recommended though as the vibration from the vacuum may stimulate the flea to the point of emergence. Pupae commonly make up 10% of the infestation in a home. Depending upon temperature and humidity, the entire life cycle of the cat flea can be completed in as little as 12 to 14 days under ideal conditions, or be prolonged to 6 months and possibly as long as a year in rare instances. However, under average household conditions, cat fleas will complete their life cycle within 3 to 4 weeks. Pupal Window Effect Once adult fleas begin to emerge from cocoons, they are vulnerable to insecticides. However, after treatment with an adulticide pupae will continue to emerge for at least 2 to 4 weeks. In fact, small numbers of fleas may continue to emerge for periods up to one year; a phenomenon called "delayed emergence." Or "Delayed Pupal Hatching" This continued emergence of fleas following treatment is called the Pupal Window. The pitfalls of the Pupal Window Effect are: Re-treatment with adulticides on the pet is needed to control the emerging fleas; and Pet owners unaware of the effect may believe the control measures used aren't working and either discontinue them or switch to other, perhaps less effective methods. A common story owners relate, is they visit a cottage for the first time since last season. Within minutes of entering they notice that their pet is covered in fleas or that their legs are being bitten by small fleas. These smaller fleas are newly emerged adults that have remained dormant since the last visit and the presence of the family has stimulated the emergence.

Adult

When the flea emerges from the cocoon, it immediately seeks a host. A flea that emerges from the pupal cocoon after a pet steps on it, can hatch, jump on the pet and begin feeding in as little as 7 seconds. Currently there is nothing available that prevents fleas jumping on the pet and feeding, as it happens so fast. There are no flea repellents, contrary to myths that fleas are repelled or killed by things like garlic or brewer's yeast. In laboratory experiments, fleas were fed brewer's yeast to sustain them until a blood meal could be introduced. There are also no clinical data to support the use of sonic flea control devices. Owners that have success with these types of treatments are usually the lucky few that would not suffer from fleas regardless of what the pet is on. Newly emerged fleas are attracted to pets by various stimuli produced by these hosts: body heat, movement and exhaled carbon dioxide. In contrast to larvae, adult cat fleas will orient and move towards light. The adult is negatively geotactic (prefers to move upward). These behaviours enhance the cat flea's success in finding a host. The newly emerged fleas move directly to the top of the carpet pile where they are more likely to encounter a passing host. The presence of fleas is not an indication of a 'dirty' home. A flea can survive in a home as long as there is a host on which to feed, regardless of sanitary conditions. If the newly emerged cat flea does not find a host, it can survive for 1-3 weeks before needing a blood meal. However once they begin, the flea must be able to feed again within 4 days or it will die. Adult fleas are dark reddish-brown, 2-5mm long, with thin, flattened bodies. Backward-directing spines on their legs and bodies facilitate forward movement through fur, hair or feathers and prevent them from being easily dislodged. Adults make up only about 5% of a population. Fleas are wingless, but have strongly developed legs that permit them to jump up to 100 times their own body length (20cm vertically and 38cm horizontally). That's the equivalent of a human jumping the length of three football fields. The G-forces (gravity pull) on the flea measure about 150g's as it jumps, compared with a G-force of 3 that astronauts experience when space shuttles take off. Fleas are very resilient due to their strong insect exoskeletons made up of a substance called chitin. It's this shell that helps the flea survive on the pet. Once on a host, the cat flea starts feeding within seconds and egg production begins within 48 hours. Contrary to what is often reported, the adult cat flea is actually a permanent ectoparasite. It does not leave the host unless it is forced off. Therefore, once on a suitable host, fleas do not leave their host voluntarily. They remain until removed by ingestion, grooming behaviour, dying a natural death or dying a chemical-induced death (insecticide application). The drawback of using only an adulticide treatment is the 95% of pre-adults waiting to develop in the environment. The adult cat flea can survive and reproduce on the host for 2-4 weeks under most natural conditions, but if not killed prematurely an adult flea may live as long as 4 months.

Health Bulletin - Fleas continued

Flea-Related Problems in Pets

Biting or scratching is usually the first reaction of an animal with fleas. Some animals may begin excessive grooming to try to rid themselves of the irritation, eating many of the fleas in the process. Light-haired dogs or cats that do this may develop an orange-brown discolouration due to salivary staining. These general symptoms are usually referred to as pruritus.

Pruritus

Pruritus (itching) is caused by reactions to flea saliva. During feeding, the flea releases saliva to stop blood from coagulating.

The saliva contains chemicals that irritate the host:

Histamine-like substances (compounds that cause allergic responses).

Proteolytic enzymes (substances that initiate the breakdown of protein).

A hapten (an incomplete antigen that becomes complete when combined with collagen in the skin).

Some animals have a higher tolerance to fleas and aren't disturbed by them. Others suffer varying levels of irritation and may react after only a few bites.

Flea Allergy Dermatitis (FAD)

Dogs and cats that are hypersensitive to flea saliva have intense reactions, often out of proportion to the number of fleas on the pet. Research indicates that FAD may be caused by intermittent exposure to large numbers of fleas. Animals sensitised in this way may become intensely reactive even if only a small number of fleas are present. This is significant as it suggests that FAD may be avoided by preventing repeated flea infestations. The initial reaction is usually a reddened wheal, which forms a papule or swollen nodule and crusts over.

After that, several secondary changes are possible:

Superficial pyoderma (skin infections affecting the skin surface).

Seborrhoea (scaling, crusting, yellowish patches on the skin).

Diffuse erythema (reddening of the skin over various parts of the body).

Hair loss.

'Hot spots' - bare, eroded, oozing patches (a severe localised skin infection or pyoderma).

The pruritus, or itching, that occurs in dogs with FAD is intense, and results in self-mutilation. Generally, clinical signs are distributed over the inner thigh and abdomen, and along the spine and hindquarters. Corticosteroids, which must be prescribed by a veterinarian, are often used to temporarily relieve clinical signs. A flea control programme is needed to resolve the problem completely.

Tapeworm (Dipylidium caninum)

This species of tapeworm uses the flea as an intermediate host in its life cycle. Egg packets deposited by the adult tapeworm are shed into the environment where they are consumed by flea larvae. If a pet ingests an adult flea that ate tapeworm eggs as a larva, the tapeworm parasite is passed on. In pets, the flea tapeworm does not usually cause serious disease. However, it can cause diarrhoea or irritation around the anus (resulting in scooting) and the segments can be seen as small rice-like objects clinging to the hind end of the animal near the base of the tail. Their presence can evoke a feeling of disgust in people interacting with pets. In addition, people can become infected if they accidentally ingest infected fleas.

Anaemia

Being blood-sucking parasites, heavy flea infestations can cause parasitic anaemia, particularly in young animals. Fleas in the genus *Ctenocephalides* have been reported to produce anaemia in dogs, cats, goats, cattle and sheep. Severe flea infestations in puppies can cause anaemia to the point of death.

Flea-Related Conditions in Humans

Fleas can reproduce on any mammalian blood supply, including humans. However, a female flea must feed for a long period of time before beginning egg production. Fleas may spend 2-3 hours sucking on one spot. But most humans will scratch or perform some action to interrupt this feeding process. As such, the flea is not able to feed for the required length of time to produce eggs. In humans, disease transmission by fleas is not a common occurrence. However, any suspected reactions should be discussed with a doctor.

Diagnosing a Flea Infestation

How to check your pet for fleas

A trained eye isn't usually needed to spot a heavy flea infestation. You'll probably notice your pet scratching, biting its coat or showing other signs of discomfort. If you run a fine metal comb through your pet's coat, you might see them crawling around on the comb afterwards.

You will often notice symptoms of a flea infestation without being able to find the culprit. That's because pets, especially cats, will groom fleas out of their coats long before you've had a chance to try and find out what's making them itch.

If you're in any doubt, carry out a simple flea check. First sit your cat or dog on a large piece of white paper (or a clean hard surface such as wooden flooring if paper is unavailable). Then rub its back vigorously for a minute or so. As you rub, any debris in your pet's coat, including flea faeces, will fall on the paper (or floor). Next pick up the piece of paper, remove any hair, and transfer the 'rubbings' onto some damp cotton wool or a damp white tissue. Leave to stand for a minute.

Flea faeces (sometimes called 'flea dirt') are made up of dried blood from the host they have bitten. When dry, they are dark brown flecks that can be easily confused with dirt or dead skin. But once transferred to the moist cotton wool or tissue, they'll dissolve and turn a lighter shade of red. So, if you can see red spots on the cotton wool, your pet has been in recent contact with fleas. Treatment is required.

Flea Treatments For Cats And Dogs

There are essentially two types of insecticides used to prevent or eliminate flea infestations:

Adulticides

To remove adult fleas from your pet

Adulticides are designed to kill adult fleas on your pet. Most work within 24 hours. However, it cannot be completely ruled out that freshly caught fleas may have had a chance to lay eggs. This is why scientists the world over agree that the most effective way to prevent or eliminate fleas is to use adulticides in combination with Insect Growth Regulators (see below). This is known as Integrated Flea Control.

Insect Growth Regulators

To eliminate flea eggs in the home

Insect Growth Regulators have been developed specifically to target the egg stage of the flea life cycle. Quite simply, they are designed to prevent flea eggs from hatching. So, if your cat or dog does shed any flea eggs around your home, they'll just die and get sucked up by the vacuum cleaner.

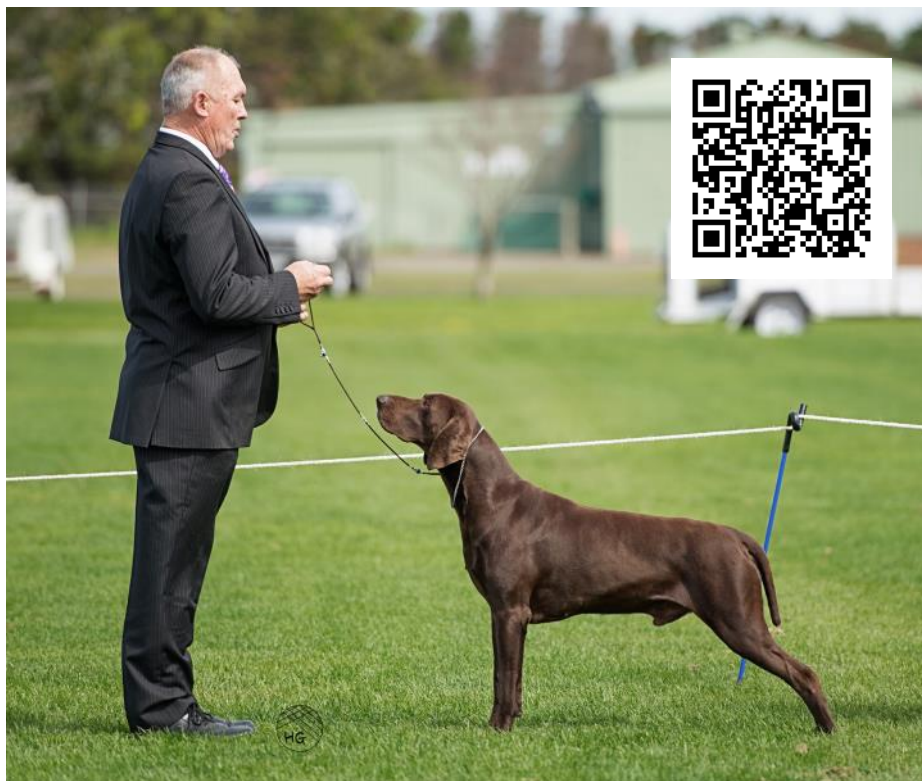
